POLICY TO PRACTICE PODCAST

CDPP's "Policy to Practice" podcast aims to enlighten a diverse audience on global issues, fostering conversations with experts to simplify complex concepts related to social, cultural, economic, and technological development.

Policy to Practice: Law & Society #9 with Prof. Prerna



In this episode of the Centre for Law, Economics and Society Podcast organised by CDPP, we sit down with Prerna, Assistant Professor of Law at NALSAR University of Law, Hyderabad. They teach a course on Law and Poverty and engage with questions of caste, social inequality, and access to justice. Prerna's doctoral research draws on critical legal theory and lived experiences of caste, disability, and transness to examine the limits of anti-discrimination law.

This episode explores how caste shapes access to justice within the criminal legal system, particularly the ways in which individuals from different caste backgrounds are treated when accused of crimes. Through this conversation, the episode highlights the structural and social dynamics that continue to influence legal processes and outcomes.

IndiGo's Turbulence and the Bigger Question, "Is India's Aviation Regulation Under Strain?"



IndiGo's recent operational crisis reveals strain in India's aviation regulation, where stretched oversight by the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) and reactive policy responses risk long-term safety and compliance. The article highlights how temporary rule relaxations and weak continuous monitoring can narrow safety margins, especially around pilot fatigue management and oversight capacity. It argues for stronger, proactive regulatory frameworks to safeguard aviation safety rather than crisis-driven fixes.

Unpacking Household Decision Making Among Agricultural Households in Uttar Pradesh, India



The article examines the decision-making power of household members in agricultural households using a mixed-methods diary approach. A total of 60 respondents from 30 Farmer Production Organization member households were surveyed through both qualitative and quantitative methods over a period of 12 months. The study highlights that women have started participating more actively in decision-making, and instances of joint decision-making are on the rise. However, the majority of decision-making power still remains with men, reflecting persistent gender disparities. Men and women's report of decision making fluctuates through the year.

Studying the Impact of Male Migration on Decision-Making by Women in Agriculture



Male migration from rural areas has been a regular trend in India. It has had consequential effects on rural women's decision-making. This article aims to contribute to the literature on understanding the relationship between migration and agrarian gender in Maharashtra, particularly focusing on four villages in Wai Block. The study explores the dynamics behind the changes in decision-making by women in agriculture due to male migration. The study reveals that they have been able to exercise some agency and can spend money earned through wages. Women had exercised collective action by working in groups in agricultural fields.

India-Africa Partnerships As A Model For Decolonising SDG 3 Implementation Through a South-South Cooperation



This article seeks to examine the foundational role of Sustainable Development Goal 3 (Good Health and Well-being) in shaping India-Africa health diplomacy, highlighting the importance of inclusive health policies in strengthening partnerships. Despite comprehensive academic and policy discussions on India-Africa health diplomacy, there is a limited research base that clearly links these efforts to the strategic objectives of SDG 3, particularly concerning gender inclusivity and mental health, which are key pillars of its focus. Health security has progressively become a cornerstone of international relations, particularly through the human security approach, which emphasis the security of the individual.

Call for better regulations on Aadhaar governance and privacy



India's Aadhaar programme, introduced as a voluntary identification system, has increasingly become mandatory through its linkage with welfare schemes and essential services, raising serious concerns about consent and exclusion. While framed as a tool for inclusion, the system's technological and procedural complexities often marginalise those it claims to empower, particularly the poor, elderly, and digitally excluded. The article highlights persistent risks around data privacy, surveillance, and repeated instances of data leaks, alongside weak accountability mechanisms. It argues that inclusion achieved through coercion undermines democratic principles and calls for stronger safeguards, transparent governance, and genuinely voluntary, rights-respecting approaches to digital identification.

Marginalised Stakeholders with Technological Barriers Across Sectors Should Be in Focus



This article highlights the persistent gender and digital divides that limit women's participation in technology, education, and the economy. Despite constitutional and SDG commitments, women remain underrepresented in STEM and the tech workforce, facing structural barriers, social norms, and limited access to digital tools. Reports by UNESCO, Oxfam, and the World Bank show significant economic losses due to this exclusion. The author argues that equitable digital access, gender-sensitive policies, community-driven initiatives, and disaggregated data are essential to ensure inclusion, procedural fairness, and sustainable empowerment for marginalised groups.

Hyderabad Hosts Ethical AI and Governance at DCS 2025



This article talks about the Digital Citizen Summit (DCS) 2025 held in Hyderabad on 14–15 November 2025, co-organised by the Digital Empowerment Foundation (DEF), Centre for Development Policy and Practice (CDPP), the Telangana government and other partners. Under the theme, “People and Platforms: Let’s Talk Accountability,” the summit examined how innovation, regulation, citizen agency, digital justice, and platform power interact in shaping digital spaces.

Undertrial disparities of caste and religion in PSI 2023 India



The Prison Statistics India 2023 reveals chronic prison overcrowding and a dominant undertrial population at 73.5%. Deep disparities emerge: while Hindus are under-represented among undertrials relative to their population share, Muslims, Sikhs, SCs, STs and OBCs are visibly over-represented, reflecting structural bias in India’s justice system. The data suggests that caste, tribe and religion significantly shape pre-trial detention outcomes, underlining urgent need for systemic reform.

Postcolonial Bollywood and Muslim Identity:






Understanding the Regulatory Landscape in India: A Comprehensive Look at Artificial Intelligence Governance in Healthcare Sector

Artificial Intelligence (AI) is rapidly transforming healthcare, from diagnostics and treatment planning to patient monitoring and administrative efficiency. The global healthcare market is projected to grow at a 5% compound annual growth rate from 2025 to 2030, reaching nearly USD 30 trillion, with inpatient and outpatient care remaining the dominant segments. Yet, the sector faces significant challenges, including fragmented regulatory landscapes, limited talent and knowledge, uneven data access, technology maturity gaps, and varying healthcare player adoption. In India, AI adoption in healthcare is accelerating, however, the regulatory framework is still evolving, with multiple agencies issuing overlapping guidelines, resulting in fragmented oversight of AI tools in healthcare.

This working paper explores and compares regulatory approaches to AI in healthcare across India, the United States, China, and the European Union. Drawing from a literature review of academic, regulatory, and policy sources, the study maps landscapes, identifies gaps, and assesses implications for patient safety, innovation, and competitiveness. By examining these jurisdictions, the study highlights lessons from different regulatory philosophies and identifies strategies that could inform India's policy evolution.
